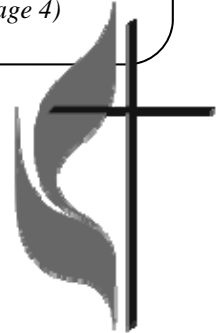

Some Thoughts From Me—Rev. Dave



April is finally here! The snow is melting, the birds are singing, baseball season is here, and before the month is out the world will have turned a delightful shade of green, as trees start to dress themselves in their leaves. For me, April is a great month. Not only do Colleen

and I celebrate our anniversary in April, but April is also when we celebrate Easter this year. There is something about the new life of spring coupled with the new life of the Resurrection that just fires up my soul. But this April I am especially excited because of two other events that are taking place.

The first event is our church-wide Visioning Retreat, which will take place on Saturday, April 16. This will be a time for the whole church to come together for a time of prayerful reflection and discernment as we seek to answer—or begin to answer—the question, “Just where is God calling HUMC to be in ministry?” There are so many needs in the world around us, and so many opportunities to get involved. Just what is God saying to us? Where would God have us focus our time, our talent, and our resources? Who is God calling us to be? Those are important questions, and they deserve a well-reasoned, thoughtful answer.

I keep finding myself drawn back to our Mission Statement, which says in part that we are called to make disciples for Jesus Christ. Just how would God have us go about doing that? What is going to be our passion in the months and years to come? I am looking forward to traveling with you as we seek to find the answers to those questions. I hope you are looking forward to the journey as well, and hope to see you on the 16th.

The second big event that excites me is the creation of a new photo directory. It has been three years since we put

together the last one, and so much has happened. For one, there is a new minister here now. That is a big change in the life of a church. For another thing, there are a lot of new faces in our church. That is an even bigger change. Changes of that magnitude require a new photo directory so we get to know one another better.

Now I realize that not everyone likes having their picture taken. Others might say, “Well, I haven’t changed very much since my last portrait, just use that one.” I want to suggest that there are a couple of important reasons for not falling into that line of thinking. One is very practical; the church receives a cash payment from Olan Mills for each sitting. It is not a huge payment by any means, but our hope is to use that payment towards are mission shares. The more families that have their pictures taken, the more we can pay on mission shares; it is that simple. But more importantly, choosing to have your picture taken as part of this directory makes a statement about being a part of this congregation. We often use language of family in talking about the church. To be a part of this directory says that you are part of the family. To opt out is to make a completely different statement. I don’t know about you, but I want everyone to know that HUMC is my family.

Last year we celebrated our 175th anniversary as a congregation. We spent a lot of time looking back at where we had been, and celebrating how

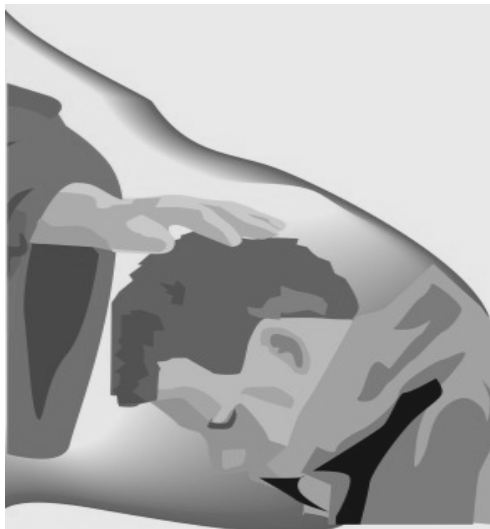

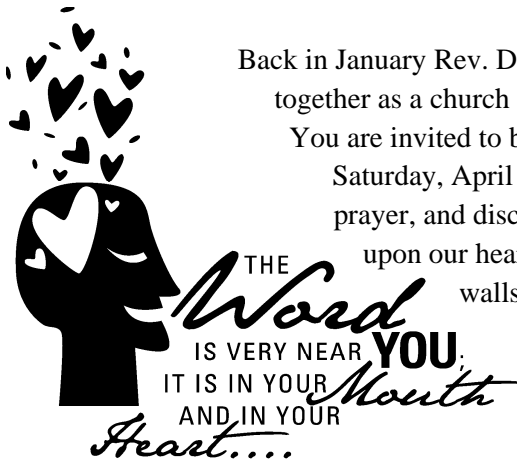

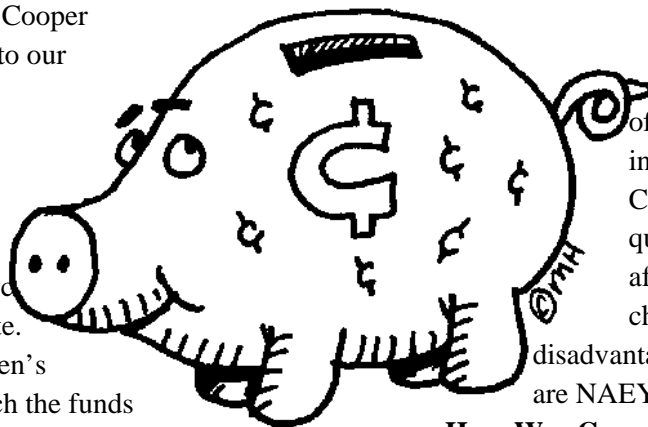
YOUTH-4-MISSION (Y4M) PLEASE FILL OUR PIG

Heritage Notes—A Page from our History — Alice Allen

137 year Heritage 1835 – 1972

As for the church itself, the land was given by Simeon Pease and the frame was raised in August 1835. The building was 32' x 40', very plain and simple, no tower or spire, no cushions for the pine seats, and just clear glass windows. There was a gallery for singers opposite the preacher, and places for large stoves in the corners near the gallery. There was no cellar under the building and some people brought foot stoves to services to keep their feet warm. The cost of this building was \$1,200. The dedication service was held on December 1, 1835. A minister stationed at Windsor, of the New York Conference, the Reverend Kellogg, preached the sermon and prayer was offered by the Reverend Francis L. Robbins, Pastor of the Enfield Congregations Church.

At this time the church was part of a circuit supplied by three different ministers. The first minister exclusively for the Hazardville Church was Walter Wilkie, appointed in 1838. There were 76 church members in his time.

The salary of this first Pastor was \$300 a year, and probably part of it was paid in provisions and firewood. The sexton in those early years was paid \$50, lighting, which was no doubt by candles, cost \$10 or \$12, and fuel about \$20, so that the entire annual expense was not more than \$400. For many years the church's principal source of income was the annual sale of pews. This was not changed until 1917. (Note: Today the discipline of the Methodist church specifically prohibits the sale of pews).

A previous writer states that in the early years of the church Sunday was not a day of rest. Morning service was at 10:30, Sunday School at 12:00, and afternoon preaching at 2:00. About 1880 the afternoon service was discontinued. On Friday evenings class meetings were held in the different sections of the parish at some member's house.

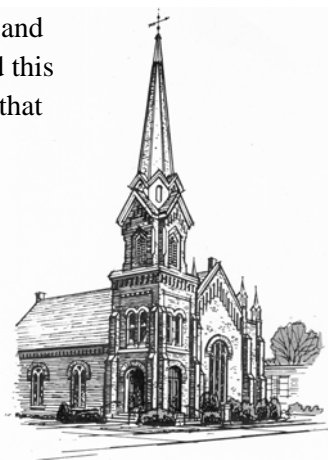
For the first fifty years there were no special meetings for young people. It was not until 1888 that a Christian Endeavor Society was organized.

The first parsonage was built in 1842. It was used only until 1848 when it was sold and another parsonage was built "more convenient to the church", next to it in fact. And this second parsonage can still be seen, right where it was built, just east of the building that was once the church, and is still called by many "the Old Church".

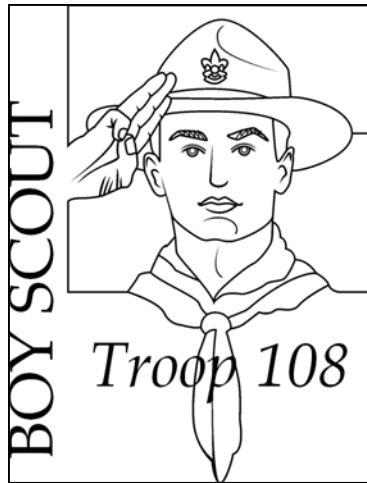
The bell, the one we still use, was bought in 1844. It seems likely that some sort of belfry was built at this time. Later, in 1852 when the church building was repaired and an addition built on the north end, a spire was erected. This addition provided the church with a vestibule over which was a gallery for singers. It was in this vestibule that the sexton rang the bell.

These dogs are very well trained -- work hard and when off duty usually are relaxing to be ready on a moment's notice by its owner/master. It takes a lot of doing to train a dog and then more time to train the person and dog to work together. Disabilities of members of our own church is on the increase, and there is a need to do something about it. The scouts understand how important it is to be there for a person who has some type of disability and to show concern. At the Troop banquet, a scout volunteered to get my meal for me...it was a welcomed surprise and indeed a pleasure. What more can I say but. . "Thanks a million."

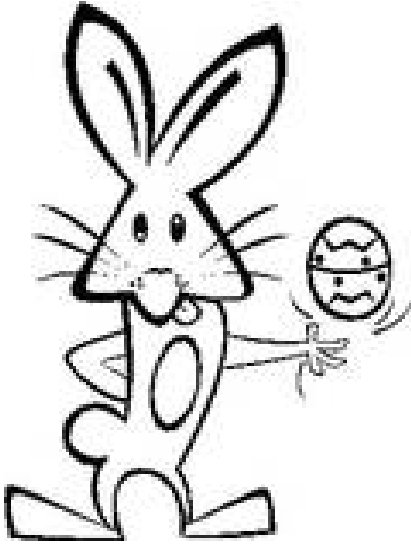
